- 1963 Degrees in Education, Teaching and Home Economics are finally accepted.
- 1987 Men are allowed to join.
- 2005 Associate Degrees are accepted.
- 2021 63% voted for open membership.
- In April, 2024, AAUW members will vote to eliminate AAUW's degree requirement for membership by a required 2/3 majority.
- AAUW's National Board, Governance Committee and Inclusion and Equity Committee support this change.



The Geneva Lake Branch of the American Association of University Women (AAUW) is reaching out to inquire whether the XXXXX Publishing Group plans to gather and publish information about the upcoming April 2nd school board elections, perhaps via surveys or candidate interviews. Your readership seeks a more comprehensive understanding of the candidates' stances and priorities.

Specifically, we recommend asking the following questions of the candidates:

- 1. What are your priorities for specific initiatives or changes to improve student outcomes, enhance the overall learning experience in our schools, and address achievement gaps to ensure that all students have equal opportunities for academic success?
- 2. How do you plan to address the challenges faced by our schools, especially in the areas of teacher support, curriculum, and student well-being? Please share your plan for teacher recruitment, addressing the shortage of qualified teachers, particularly in STEM subjects.
- 3. How will you balance the need for diverse perspectives and academic freedom with the concerns some community members have about curriculum and certain books in school libraries?
- 4. How will you address the school funding crisis currently facing our schools? As a school board member, how will you work with other board members and the district's administrators to effectively create a sustainable budget that truly reflects the district's educational priorities?
